

# What happened?


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
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
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
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- Even with Greens, no constitutional amendments/election of FCC judges possible



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  - Far right, so extreme that Marine Le Pen kicked them out of ID group, pro-Russian & now officially designated right-wing extremist, are strongest opposition party
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- · Weimar vibes, anyone?

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
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- Social and political change, global crisis of liberal democracy
- But also: outgoing government spectacularly unpopular



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## Normalisation and increasing salience of far right positions & actors


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  - CDU/CSU pivoted from economy to immigration
- CDU/CSU, (most of) FDP getting a purely symbolic anti-immigration motion through parliament with AfD support just days before election



#### Who votes for the AfD?

- AfD vote still mostly driven by backlash against immigration & Islamophobia (also some "culture-war" issues)
- Well-known pattern remain (less educated, more eastern, more male, more working class, more worried)
- But 5.5 million additional votes (+115%)
  - Retained most of the 2021 voters (all estimates based on exit polls))
  - · Plus 1.8 million former non-voters
  - Plus 1 million from CDU/CSU, 0.9 million from FDP, 0.7 million from SPD

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All while right-wing extremists' control over party ever more obvious

#### Why the LEFT surge?

- Finally getting rid of the national populists
- Excellent, social-media savvy campaign
- Benefited from anti-AfD mobilisation and disappointment with SPD and Greens

What now?

## Germany and Ukraine/NATO?

- New government (especially Chancellor, FM, Defence) committed to supporting Ukraine, less reluctant than Scholz
  - Possibly stronger commitment to European defence & NATO
  - Spending limits lifted
- But parts of the SPD still committed to "peace" and reconciliation with Soviet Union  $\approx$  Russia (same goes for a small group within CDU)
- AfD still trying to mobilise fears of nuclear war & parading Russian talking points

#### **Germany and Europe?**

- Two parties in charge that shaped Germany's pro-European default; Merz a former MEP, but ...
- CDU/CSU
  - Committed to "regaining control" over borders, i.e. controls, push backs, even if breaks German/European law and angers neighbours
  - More nationalist/right-wing than previous government & Merkel governments
- Too pre-occupied with pressure at home to truly engage?

What now?

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- In Berlin, a keen sense of crisis ("democracy's last bullet") ...
- ... but also an overwhelming sense of more of the same & politics for the over-50s
- How can liberal democratic institutions deal with a large, illiberal, anti-system party?
- · Mainstream politicians should
  - · Not erode norm of exclusion of anti-democrats
  - · Not try to beat far right on their own territory
  - Not parrot/fixate on anti-democrats but dare to set their own agenda
